NOTES FROM THE CHAIRMAN

To keep everyone as safe as possible, the theatre is asking volunteers and performers to Lateral Flow Test three times a week during a production and where possible link these tests in with days they are attending the theatre. We understand this is not enforceable but is in line with other societies in the area. Let's hope 2022 will see a time when these safeguards are less necessary.

During 2022 we are going to bring back a 'new look' printed version of the What's On and during March we hope to introduce a weekly Sunday Afternoon Concert in the Art Gallery – might even be tea and cake included!

During 2022 we would like to grow our volunteer base we understand that modern life does not always allow people to donate regular amounts of time, so the old proverb 'many hands make light work' will be our 2022 mantra.

COVID SAFETY

Keeping us safe at the Theatre

Following the announcement made by the Prime Minister on Wednesday 8th December, it has been announced on the BBC website that mask wearing in theatres will be mandatory from Friday 10th December.

As Christmas approaches, and into the New Year, it is vital that we ensure the Stables Theatre continues to be a safe environment to visit and work in.

So in light of the latest UK Government mandate, all audience members will need to wear face coverings around the building unless exempt (or whilst actively eating and drinking), and we ask audience members to take a rapid lateral flow test (LFT) before attending a performance – many people are already doing this as part of their current work pattern. Face coverings are mandatory. LFT are a suggestion.

First nights of all Stables plays will continue to be fully masked and socially distanced performances.

The Stables has adopted testing protocols for all Front of House, Bar, Box Office, Backstage crews, as well as performers. We also have enhanced cleaning, contactless ticketing and the ability to exchange tickets if unable to attend due to Covid-19.

Everyone is working extremely hard to ensure that theatre continues to be a welcoming place for all and we thank you for your continued support of The Stables Theatre'

THE STABLES THEATRE – COUNCIL of MANAGEMENT

The Council of Management of the Theatre has been busy during the year despite the various problems caused by the pandemic. The Council has met once a month as usual, either in person at the Theatre or from home by Zoom.

A lot of work has been going on in the building i.e.

- a new internet system has been installed providing wi-fi access throughout the building
- signage on the outside of the building has been updated and installed
- volunteers have been working hard outside tidying and improving the gardens
- the fire alarm system has been updated

Council members have been working "behind the scenes"

- bringing our various Policies up to date
- applying for and dealing with grants etc.
- members of the Box Office have been busy with bookings and also with ticket cancellations and refunds etc. caused by the periods of lock-down and performances which have had to be cancelled due to team members testing positive for Covid. Changes in the programme caused by the pandemic have made a lot of extra work.
- the membership system has been updated and improved. We have changed direct debit providers and are now more in touch with our members
- marketing is being updated
- the Theatre has been taking part in a project "the use of theatre" run by the Royal Holloway, University of London.
- the New Writing competition was very successful and will be run annually. Plays chosen will be staged at the Theatre
- the Bar is doing well despite the various problems caused by Covid

We look forward to seeing all our members at the Theatre again very soon.

HERE AT LAST IS LOVE

by David Charles Manners

A fascinating piece of gay history. The fact this is based entirely on direct personal experience, a necessarily secret history, makes it all the more poignant and delicious. – Sir Matthew Bourne

The Stables Hastings, BallyBest Productions and Beckman Unicorn announce *Here at Last is Love*, a new play by David Charles Manners based on the astonishing, unseen archives of The Pink Sink. This secret, WWII drinking club met in the basement of the Ritz Hotel, presided over by its remarkable doyenne and procuress 'Sodomy Johnson'.

The Pink Sink provided refuge, hospitality and more for some of the most significant and glittering figures of London wartime gay life. With such members as Terence Rattigan and Michael Pitt-Rivers, this assembly of writers, poets, actors, army officers and MI5 agents bear unabashed, amused, passionate witness to their hidden existences through letters, diaries, and verbatim reminiscence, with a dash of song and dance.

Written as a revue of the period, *Here at Last is Love* tells their story – the frightening, sometimes comical, pressures they were under to hide their illegal sexuality, and the rich, joyful lives and loves they pursued in private that sustained them through the dehumanising horrors of active service.

Here at Last is Love will be directed by Jason Morell, whose work includes Love is Only Love (Minerva Theatre/The Other Place), Love, Loss and Chianti (Riverside Studios/Minerva Theatre), The Song of Lunch (Pleasance, Edinburgh), Against Prejudice! (Belgrade Theatre Coventry/Sam Wanamaker

Playhouse), Laments (Sam Wanamaker Playhouse) and The Cutting of the Cloth (RNT Studio).

Here at Last is Love will be staged at The Stables in May 2022, with audition notices to be posted in the New Year.

Dear Actors,

I feel we're so lucky to have this connection with the Chicago Heights theatre.

It's such a fun thing to do – go out to the States with a load of thesps and put on a daft play. And this play is DAFT.

I initially had some concerns about it as it's dated and somewhat sexist but Chicago have requested it and it is very, very funny – so we will present it as the period piece it is. And, as we in theatre all know, there is nothing like making people laugh.

This will be a big commitment for Cast and Crew.

You will need to be available for a UK production in May, between 6th and 14th, while stage show dates in Chicago are between June 10th and 19th. There will be time either side for exploring and we will be hosted, free of charge, by our colleagues in Chicago.

The Play

John Smith is a London cabbie with his own taxi, a wife in Streatham, a wife in Wimbledon and a knife-edge schedule. He has been a successful, if tired, bigamist for three years but, one day, gallantly intervening in a mugging, he is taken to hospital with mild concussion. In the ensuing complications John tries to cope with a succession of well-meaning but prying policemen, the press, two increasingly irate wives and a gay neighbour, until he manfully confesses the truth – but no-one believes him!

The action takes place in two London flats, both represented on stage.

The cast is made up of six men and two women – all funny, quirky parts with masses of opportunity for imaginative, idiosyncratic performances.

The musical by George Stiles and Anthony Drewe (also responsible for stage versions of 'Mary Poppins' and 'The Wind in the Willows'). Based on 'The Ugly Duckling' by Hans Christian Andersen. 4 m 4 f or a few more if needed. I think its delightful and very funny. Simple music and lyrics even for non-singers. First performed at the Watermill Newbury and then transferred to the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough and the National Theatre before going around the world in over 300 productions picking up Olivier and Tony awards.

The authors and all the productions I know of never envisaged feathery body suits, masks or beaks. Where possible they thought of the human counterpart of each character and used that as a basis for both the costume design and the way in which the part is played. In the script they refer to judiciously placed baseball caps giving the impression of ducks' beaks or a set of red hair-rollers bearing an uncanny resemblance to a chicken's comb. The tag line for the publicity could be 'A celebration of being different' - it would be a wonderfully fun show to be part of and to see.

Dial "M" for Murder by Frederick Knott

Directed by Adrian Bowd

Production Dates -: Friday 1st April – Saturday 9th April 2022

1950s London: wealthy Sheila Wendice had a brief affair with a writer, Max, while her husband Tony, a professional tennis player, was away on tour. Tony discovers her indiscretion, and enlists the help of an old acquaintance to have her killed so he can inherit her money. Things don't go according to plan however, but Tony manages to frame her for murder, leaving her to face the death penalty, and leaving him to still inherit her wealth.

The 1954 American film "Dial M for Murder" directed by Alfred Hitchcock starring Grace Kelly and Ray Milland owes its success to the original stage play of the same name, written by Frederick Knott, which opened in London's West End in June 1952, and then on to New York's Broadway in October. The film earned an estimated \$2.7 million in North American box office sales in 1954, and the play has remained a big favourite with theatre audiences.





BALKAN ADVENTURE

Award-winning adventurer John Pilkington spent five months in 2013 exploring the Balkan mountains. "I'd visited Yugoslavia briefly in the 1970s," he says. "Since then they've abandoned communism, suffered brutal conflicts, and taken small steps towards coming together with the rest of Europe. In Bosnia and Kosovo I found people still traumatised, but many were working hard to create a peaceful future." John

also met people in the remotest villages of Albania, Macedonia and Bulgaria. His stunning photos and inspiring commentary will make this a talk not to be missed.
