Draining the Swamp

The life and activities of Sir Edward Mosley

This provocative new play looks at the British Fascist leader from the 1930s to the 1960s. It links Mosley's world and that of his second wife, Diana Mitford, to contemporary politicians and populist movements - with a chilling 2019 conclusion. Settings include Parliament, Mosley's home, and Goebbels' home in Berlin where the Mosleys married, with Hitler as witness, in 1936. The play raises difficult questions about the state of politics today and our approach to extremist politicians.
