

In the wake of his departure from Steeleye Span, Peter Knight turned his attention to the Gigspanner Trio establishing their reputation as one of the most genuinely ground-breaking forces on the British folk scene, inspiring Maverick magazine to write "Gigspanner are pushing at the boundaries, and in the process are making some of the most beautiful music the genre has to offer." They take self-penned material along with music rooted in the British Isles and beyond, and with the flick of a bow, a finely chosen chord or slip of a beat, produce richly atmospheric arrangements "with notes seemingly plucked from the stars and rhythms from the equator." 

She thinks that winning a local beauty contest will restore her reputation and make her into somebody in her small Mississippi town. Family and friends are a dysfunctional bunch who tackle life in their own peculiar ways. A former beauty queen cousin, Elain, comes to offer advice (but also to run away from her husband and children). Elain's brother, Delmount, has returned from a mental institution to sell the family home and provide Carnelle another way out of her unhappy life. Carnelle's seamstress, sweet and strange Popeye, also enters into the chaos to offer advice, but falls in love with Delmount. What can Carnelle and the others learn from the chaos?

Catholicism and the appeal of dictatorship are never far from the surface in Puccini's *Tosca*. Can religion or revolution change human nature? *Becomina* Tosca relocates the action to a country founded on Jesuit colonisation, where religion jostles with capitalism and self-interest; a society seeking solutions to all-pervasive inequalities and oppression. Does the church love repentance? Or does it prefer punishment?

Here is a show of revolution, romance and tragedy, combining newly-composed music with a tango flavour and an abridged version of Puccini's sumptuous score - a gripping evening from the opening chords!
